Last month we didn't get a chance to write about Te Matatini which was held 22nd-25th Hui-tanguru.




Our whānau were absolutely incredible. Nieces, nephews, cousins, siblings and mokopuna were standing side by side on the Te Matatini stage giving it their all.

What motivated you to accept this role?

Being away from home for a few years in Australia, Kata and I decided it was time to come home and raise our children at home, surrounded by our whānau.

I taua wā, i ahau e mōhio ana tētahi mea i ngaro i roto i ahau, ko tōku reo Māori, ā, ko te ao Māori hoki. I whakaaro au, ka hoki mai ki te Marae kia whakakaha ai tōku tūhono ki te Hapū. I runga i tērā, i pānuitia e au tētahi tono ki te whānau, "Who would be interested in taking up leadership roles for Taumutu". So I contacted the office to see how I could help, and I stood before the whānau expressing that I would like to do this mahi for our Hapū. Ki au nei, kia whakakaha ai toku tūhono ki te Hapū, kia whai wāhi atu ki te Marae, ā, ka āwhinatia te Hapū hoki, koirā te mea nui!

What do you want to achieve in this role?

Mā te rongo ka mōhio, mā te mōhio ka marama, mā te marama ka mātau, mā te mātau ka ora! I am on a learning journey, listening and watching my Aunties, Uncles and cousins on the Marae. So in learning the ropes, I want to have the understanding, knowledge and skills to continue, in any role needed for our Hapū, mō tātou ā mō ngā uri ā muri ake nei. I whārikihia mā mātou te huanui e ngā Matua Tīpuna, me mahi tonu, me whawhai tonu mō te oranga o tātou Ngāi Te Ruahikihiki.

E te whānau, I encourage you all to come home and reconnect with each other. There are a lot of kaupapa happening that we can get involved with, there are a lot of opportunities to hang out with our pakeke, there are a lot of opportunities to bring our tamariki to meet their cousins, ka mutu, there are kaupapa that are yet to start, but may need YOU to spark the flame.

Rūnanga Portfolios

Te Taumutu Rūnanga has three Portfolios that undertake mahi and kaupapa on our whānau priorities. If you wish to join a Portfolio, please contact the office at <u>Taumutu@ngaitahu.iwi.ng</u>. Please find an outline of the three Portfolios below:

Kaitiakitanga Portfolio

The Kaitiakitanga Portfolio consists of mana whenua who are interested in the taiao. The mahi undertaken by this portfolio works towards achieving environmental outcomes that benefit Taumutu whānau and align with our Iwi Management Plan. We manage engagement requests from local government to voluntary organisations that undertake a wide range of projects. This Portfolio is led by Bridget Robilliard and our strategic goals include mahinga kai, wāhi tapu, wāhi taonga.

We meet on a bimonthly basis in the evening. Our portfolio members have a wide range of skills and knowledge. If this Kaupapa sounds like you, then please get in contact with the office to join up.

Ruahikihikitanga Portfolio

Kia Ruahikihiki te hā, Kia Ruahikihiki te manawa, Kia Ruahikihiki te oranga. Ruahikihiki in thought Ruahikihiki in heart, Ruahikihiki at our core.

Ruahikihikitanga is the portfolio responsible for growing, advocating and strengthening our hapū culture and identity. The portfolio, led by Puamiria Parata-Goodall, works on those kaupapa that are important to us. Those kaupapa include whakapapa, kawa me ōna tikanga, ngā kōrero me ngā taonga tuku iho, tō tātou tino rangatiratanga, te reo me ōna tikanga, oranga kaumatua. Examples of some of the kaupapa we lead out include the following.

Te Atakura – participation at the biennial rūnanga festival. Te Atakura was established by Puamiria, Maani Stirling and Maatakiwi Wakefield to provide a platform for growing the support for our paepae through waiata, haka, mõteatea, poi and waiata tira.

Te Whare o Te Ruahikihiki Wānanga Series – wānanga series to explore and grow our understanding and expertise around our kawa, tikanga, kōrero tuku iho, mahinga kai, karanga, whaikōrero, waiata.

Pou Whenua – cultural narrative work for buildings, schools, landscapes and organisations. Creation of pou whenua – markers on the landscape. Naming of schools, buildings, organisations, landscapes and programmes. We meet one evening per month. If arts, culture, heritage and strengthening our Ruahikihiki identity is a passion of yours and you would like to be involved, then please get in touch.

<u>Oranga Portfolio</u>

The Oranga Portfolio (previously known as Hauora) is led by Liz Hill-Taiaroa. This Portfolio takes on Kaupapa to drive and uphold the tino rangatiratanga of Te Ruahikihikitanga ki Taumutu. We do this by engaging with mahi that strengthens and embeds our mātauranga, kawa and tikanga within our partner wellbeing institutions. For example, we engage with local health organisations, the Department of Corrections, and local schools.
